ACMGAS206 Provide basic first aid for animals (RELEASE 1)

Unit description

This unit of competency covers the process of providing essential first aid for animals by recognising and responding to an emergency using basic first aid measures. The first aider is not expected to deal with complex casualties or incidents, but to provide an initial response where first aid is required.

No licensing, legislative, regulatory or certification requirements apply to this unit at the time of publication.

Application of the unit

This unit is applicable to new entrants to the animal care and management industry. Animal care may occur in a wide variety of workplaces, including retail pet stores, kennels and catteries, shelters, veterinary practices, zoos, animal research facilities and others.

In addition to legal and ethical responsibilities, all units of competency in the ACM Animal Care and Management Training Package have the requirement for animals to be handled gently and calmly. The individual is required to exhibit appropriate care for animals so that stress and discomfort are minimised.

Estimated duration of unit

This unit is delivered in two days (6 hours per day), comprising theory, practical delivery, and some practical assessments. Students are also required to complete written assessments and review of materials at home in their own time. Students have 2 weeks from the end of the delivery days to complete and return written assessments.

Expected delivery locations

The unit is primarily delivered at the Sydney Shelter (201 Rookwood Road, Yagoona), with occasional delivery at regional centres if there is sufficient demand.

Expected delivery modes

This course is face-to-face learning.

Entry requirements

- Due to RSPCA policy, students must be at least 18 years old, with the appropriate approval to work or study in Australia.
- · There are no education requirements for entry into this course.
- Due to the nature of the animal industry, emotional resilience is advantageous.



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Unit content

This unit covers the following areas:

- Recognising emergency situations
- Identifying hazards
- Minimising risks
- · Assessing the physical condition of the animal and recording vital signs
- Reassuring the animal
- · Handling the animal in a safe and humane manner to minimise pain and further injuries
- · Applying basic first aid care to a range of animals
- · Seeking first aid assistance when required
- · Complying with Workplace Health and Safety requirements when handling animals

- Kennel hand
- Cattery attendant
- Pet shop attendant
- Assistant dog groomer
- Wildlife carer

Pathways from this qualification

This unit can be completed as stand-alone learning or used as a component in completing future qualifications from the Animal Care and Management Training Package (ACM).
